Provides heat assistance during the winter season: November 1st to March 31st. Maximum allowed payment is \$175. Assistance is available one time per heating season to clients in disconnect status. Clients must be at 200% or below of the federal poverty level to be eligible. Must bring income verification for all persons in household age 18 and over for the past 3 months, social security cards for each household member, DP&L, and Vectren bill to the interview. Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) eligibility must be at 150% or below of the federal poverty level to be considered for the percentage of income payment plan. Walk-ins are accepted

starting November 1st. Walk-ins are seen on first-come, first served basis and there will be a limited number of walk-ins accepted per each day.

Provides summer crisis cooling assistance to eligible households at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, age 60 years and older, disabled, or persons with a medical condition aggravated by heat. Maximum amount allowed is \$175. In order to qualify, customers need to bring the following: total household income for past 3 months, social security cards for all household members, current DP&L or Vectren bill, if not disabled or age 60+, documentation of co-payment (must be in customer's file if amount due is over the maximum amount of \$175), and doctor's statement of breathing/medical disorders aggravated by heat (if customer is under 60 years of age). Call for an appointment at 1-866-504-7379. Limited walk-in appointments are available. The 719 S. Main Street location is an all day Walk-in site- 7:00a.m to 3:00p.m, Monday- Friday. The other two sites are appointments only.

Daybreak operates a 24-hour crisis hotline and emergency shelter for runaway and homeless youth ages 10 to 18. Services include shelter; food; clothing; referrals for individual, family, or group counseling; life skills education; programs that promote safe and healthy behavior; and educational support. Offers free transportation to shelter— call the hotline operator or go to one of over 300 Safe Place sites (identified by large yellow signs) within the community.

Daybreak's housing program serves homeless young adults ages 18 to 21. Program participants are provided with a furnished apartment (with the responsibility of upkeep and paying partial rent while working toward self-sufficiency); life skills training including parenting, budgeting, housekeeping, and meal planning; educational enhancement including tutoring, GED preparation, and computer skills; employment assistance including interview skills and resume preparation; and ongoing counseling and encouragement.

Daybreak's street outreach program provides young adults who are couch-hopping or living on the street a place to shower and do laundry; food; toiletries; help accessing community resources; and help obtaining safe, permanent housing. The street outreach program is often the gateway to the shelter and housing programs.

The families invest hundreds of hours of their own labor --sweat equity- into building their own houses and houses of others. In addition, partner families are required to attend 30 hours of workshops in consumer credit counseling, legal documents, insurance, home maintenance, budgeting, community resources and community involvement. Direct services include personal contact from staff and volunteers, home visits, one-on-one mentors, educational classes, sweat equity management, and ongoing communication and nurturing to assure families' success as a mortgage-paying homeowner and self-sufficient citizen of the community.
